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HORSHAM SHOW COMPETITION REGULATIONS

PHOTOGRAPHY ENTRIES CLOSE ON SEPTEMBER 10TH.

ALL OTHER ONLINE ENTRIES CLOSE ON SEPTEMBER 18TH.

Non-perishable exhibits can be delivered to the Maydale Pavilion from Monday 21st August until Thursday 21st September.

All perishables including cookery, flowers, fruit, and vegetable exhibits, to be delivered on Friday 22nd September between 9am and 11am.

- Any entry that has previously won first prize at the Horsham Show is ineligible to compete.
- All entries must be the work of the exhibitor (one person).
- All exhibitors must be amateurs in the particular class in which they are exhibiting.
- Society reserves the right to refuse an exhibit or an exhibitor for not observing pavilion rules without notice.

GRICULTURAL

- Regional judging of all WASA competitions will take place later in 2023. Winners of those sections will be notified.
- Local VAS Ltd winners (see VAS Ltd sections below), who then go on to win at WASA final will compete at next State Final at Royal Melbourne Show.
- The society will not tolerate any disorderly, disruptive or offensive behaviour towards volunteers, stewards and judges. At any time if any patron is behaving in an unacceptable manner they will be asked to leave the showgrounds.
- Class and Section selection is the responsibility of the entrant. Items deemed not eligible for a section will be moved to an "open" section and judged

SHOWGROUNDS SAFETY

The Horsham Agricultural Society Inc is committed to providing a safe, healthy, and environmentally acceptable space for all stakeholders. We shall maintain an effective health and safety program so far as is practicable and endeavour to comply with all statutory and Common Law requirements. All competitors and exhibitors have a "Duty of Care" to avoid exposing themselves or other people to unsafe situations that could lead to injury.

WIMMERA AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES ASSOCIATION (WASA) COMPETITION REGULATIONS

- A person having won at a local Show will compete at a Wimmera Group final in November. A committee member will contact any eligible exhibitors prior to the competition to arrange the details of entering and collecting exhibits. The show committee cannot accept responsibility for exhibits outside of these parameters.
- A person having won at Show level, is not eligible for entry at any other show until after the Group judging when, if not the winning entry, can compete again.
- Each article entered must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
- If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group Final, then second place-getter is eligible to compete.
- WASA entrants must reside in the boundaries of the Wimmera Group.
- Winners at WASA Group Final receive \$25 cash.
- Items, except Cookery Exhibits which are entered in the Wimmera final judging must be exactly the same as won at local Show

VICTORIAN AGRICULTURAL SHOWS (VAS LTD) COMPETITION REGULATIONS

- A person can represent only one Society or Group for VAS Ltd
- An article having won at Show level will compete at Group Final, winner will then compete at next Royal Melbourne Show. A committee member will contact any eligible exhibitors prior to the competition to arrange the details of entering and collecting exhibits. The show committee cannot accept responsibility for exhibits outside of these parameters.
- An article having won Group Final cannot compete further until after the Royal Melbourne Show.
- An article having won at the Royal Melbourne Show in any class is no longer eligible to compete in the competition.
- Each article entered must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
- If for any reason the winner is unable to compete at Group or State final level then the second Place getter is eligible to compete.
- Items, except Cookery exhibits, must be the same as won at local Show or Group.
- A person will not be permitted to win at more than one Show within the State in any one Show year. Persons not adhering to this rule will be required to forfeit/refund prize money.
- An article having won first at a show cannot be shown at any other state show that year. All work to have been completed within the last 12 months



- 1. This competition is a test of the dog's jumping ability.
- 2. The competition is open to all dogs of all shapes and sizes.
- 3. The dog is permitted to jump on to or over the jump.
- 4. A dog who has won at a Local Show/Field Day Level will qualify for the State Final.
- 5. A dog can represent only one Local Show/Field Day.
- 6. All dogs not competing must be on a lead with a handler in the marshalling area behind the competition area.
- 7. Competition area should be 15 metres long by 8 metres wide.
- 8. Only one dog may be loose in the competition area at any one time.
- 9. There must be a handler at the top of the jump to act as a catcher if necessary, and a handler as a catcher at the bottom.
- 10. The dog's owner must supply one extra handler.
- 11. A ladder will be provided for the handler.
- 12. Each dog is allowed three attempts at each height.
- 13. In the event of two dogs jumping the same height, the winner shall be determined as the dog that took the least number of attempts for the wining height.
- 14. A dog may compete on a loose lead.
- 15. If the dog is not on a loose lead the dog must be released at a minimum of three metres from the jump.
- 16. Any mishandling or misuse of a dog will incur immediate disqualification.
- 17. If, in the opinion of the stewards, a dog is unsafe to other competitors or the public, it will be withdrawn from the competition.
