ENTERING ONLINE – VIA SHOWDAY ONLINE (Entries close at 5pm Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> September) \*\*NOTE\*\* Entries placed online will NOT need to fill out a second paper entry form. However, you will still need to fill out (or print from home) Entry Cards which must to be attached to each exhibit. This is best done at home before delivery to the Maydale Pavilion, where possible. Entry Cards are also available from the Show Office.

Online and written entries close *5pm Wednesday* 17<sup>th</sup> *September*.

- 9. On the pop up tick the box to accept the entry notes for this section
- 10. Click the PLUS symbol beside the section you are entering to expand to the classes
- 11. Click on the class or classes you are entering to select them
- 12. If entering multiple items into the same class, increase the QTY counter to reflect the number you would like to enter
- 13. Fill out the items name in the Exhibition Name box if applicable eg. Photo sunrise
- 14. Fill in any additional information the show may require for this entry if asked

<u>Jams, preserves, eggs, handcraft, art, scarecrows and LEGO exhibits – by Friday 19th September</u> Exhibits can be delivered to the Show Office (Maydale Pavilion) from 1<sup>st</sup> September Monday – Friday. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED. Judging will be done on Thursday, 25<sup>th</sup> September.

\*All perishables including cookery, flowers, fruit, vegetables and the biggest weed – between 9am - 11am, Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> September

\*Exhibits with Entry Cards attached, must be delivered to the newly purposed poultry shed which is located at the rear of the Maydale Pavilion for judging. There is ample parking. Please follow the signs.

### **Lapidary:**

Must be delivered to Lapidary Clubrooms, Old Police Station, 24 Roberts Ave, Horsham by Wednesday 13th August 2025 for pre-judging. Each entry to be in a separate package. Once the judging has been completed, exhibits will be taken to the Poultry Shed at Maydale Reserve, Horsham Showgrounds for display at the Horsham Show.

### HORSHAM SHOW COMPETITION REGULATIONS

- 1. Any entry that has previously won first prize at the Horsham Show is ineligible to compete.
- 2. All entries must be the work of the exhibitor.
- 3. All exhibitors must be amateurs in the Class in which they are exhibiting.
- 4. Horsham Agricultural Society reserves the right to refuse an exhibit or an exhibitor for not observing pavilion rules without notice.
- 5. Regional judging of all WASA competitions will take place on November 8<sup>th</sup> at Natimuk. Winners of those sections will be notified.
- 6. Local VAS Ltd winners, who then go on to win at WASA final will compete at the next State Final at Royal Melbourne Show.
- 7. The Horsham Agricultural Society does not tolerate any disorderly, disruptive or offensive behaviour towards volunteers, stewards and judges. At any time if any patron is behaving in an unacceptable manner, they will be asked to leave the showgrounds.
- 8. Class and Section selection is the responsibility of the entrant. Items deemed not eligible for a section will be moved to an "open" section and judged accordingly.
- 9. All competitions included in this schedule are subject to change.

### **SHOWGROUNDS SAFETY**

The Horsham Agricultural Society Inc is committed to providing a safe, healthy, and environmentally acceptable space for all stakeholders. We shall maintain an effective health and safety program so far as is practicable and endeavour to comply with all statutory and Common Law requirements. All competitors and exhibitors have a "Duty of Care" to avoid exposing themselves or other people to unsafe situations that could lead to injury.

### **VICTORIAN AGRICULTURAL SHOWS (VAS LTD) REGULATIONS**

- 1. A person can represent only one Society / Group for VAS Ltd
- 2. An article having won at Show level will compete at Group Final; winner will then compete at next Royal Melbourne Show. A committee member will contact any eligible exhibitors prior to the competition to arrange the details of entering and collecting exhibits. The show committee cannot accept responsibility for exhibits outside of these parameters.
- 3. An article having won Group Final cannot compete further until after the Royal Melbourne Show.
- 4. An article having won at the Royal Melbourne Show in any class is no longer eligible to compete in the competition.
- 5. Each entry must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
- 6. If for any reason the winner is unable to compete at Group or State final level, then the second-Place getter is eligible to compete.
- 7. Items, except Cookery exhibits, must be the same as won at local Show or Group.
- 8. A person will not be permitted to win at more than one Show within the State in any one Show year. Persons not adhering to this rule will be required to forfeit/refund prize money.
- 9. An article having won first at a show cannot be shown at any other state show that year. All work to have been completed within the last 12 months.

### WIMMERA AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES ASSOCIATION (WASA) REGULATIONS

1. A person having won at a local Show will compete at a Wimmera Group final in November 8<sup>th</sup> at Natimuk. A committee member will contact any eligible exhibitors prior to the competition to arrange the details of entering and collecting exhibits. The show committee cannot accept responsibility for exhibits outside of these parameters.



- 2. A person having won at Show level, is not eligible for entry at any other show until after the Group judging when, if not the winning entry, can compete again.
- 3. Each article entered must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
- 4. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group Final, then second placegetter is eligible to compete.
- 5. WASA entrants must reside in the boundaries of the Wimmera Group.
- 6. Winners at WASA Group Final receive \$25 cash.
- 7. Items, except Cookery Exhibits which are entered in the Wimmera final judging must be exactly the same as won at the Horsham Show.

### **COLLECTION OF EXHIBITS**

Exhibits, prize cards and ribbons (if applicable) can be picked up from 29th September 2025 from the Horsham Agricultural Society Office at Maydale Reserve (Horsham Showgrounds).

### **GENERAL SHOW REGULATIONS**

- 1. In the event of the judges failing to attend and adjudicate, the committee may appoint judges in their stead, who shall be deemed to be the judges originally appointed.
- 2. All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor, except where otherwise noted in the schedule.
- 3. No exhibit will be allowed to compete in more than one class or group, except in classes as specially mentioned.
- 4. Entries in writing and online must be lodged with the secretary at the Society's office by closing date fixed in the prize schedule. NO LATE WRITTEN ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.
- 5. The Committee reserves the absolute right to refuse admission to the ground of any exhibit for any reason seeming sufficient to the committee, provided that an entry fee paid be refunded. The owner or exhibitor of any exhibit disapproved of as an exhibit by the Committee of the Society must, immediately on notice to that effect, remove such exhibit from the Society's grounds. The Committee reserves the right of refusing or cancelling any entry without giving reasons for doing so.
- 6. The judges may award a section prize instead of a first; or may withhold a prize altogether where, in their judgement, the quality of the exhibits so warrant.
- 7. No prize shall be awarded by the judge for extra exhibits of the prize lists contains a class or section in which the same can compete.
- 8. The committee may withhold any prize when mis-statements have erroneously or fraudulently been made regarding any exhibit, and exhibitors guilty of false entries or statements may be debarred from again exhibiting, and if members, will be liable to expulsion from the Society.
- 9. Should any exhibitor having gained a prize be disqualified, the next on the list does not necessarily obtain the same prize. The Committee, with or without the advice of the judges, shall make all required awards.
- 10. The Committee shall also have the power to require statutory declarations be made concerning any animals or article exhibited.
- 11. All persons exhibiting shall accept the decision of the judges, and in the case of written protests or disputes as to the construction of any of these regulations, or the meaning of anything in the prize list, the decision of the Committee shall be accepted as final and without appeal.
- 12. Protests must be lodged with a deposit of \$100 (which may be forfeited if considered frivolous) to the secretary in writing, on the day of competition.
- 13. The privileges of distributing trade lists, advertisements, or other documents is restricted exclusively to exhibitors at the respective stands. Any infringement of this regulation will incur expulsion from the grounds.
- 14. Every care will be taken of exhibits, but no responsibility will be incurred by the Society. The Society will not be responsible for any accident that may be caused through or by any exhibit, and it shall be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the Society harmless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings arising from such accident.
- 15. The Committee may at any time for such reasons as may seem sufficient to it, waive in individual cases, or generally, compliance with the regulations or may extend or vary the times for doing anything fixed by the regulations or the prize schedule, either in individual cases or generally.
- 16. In compiling the schedule, all care has been taken, but no responsibility will be incurred by the Society for omissions or misprints. The program is subject to change without notification.

- 6. An exhibitor having won at their local Show will bake another cake for the 2026 Group Final and then the winner of the Group Final will bake another cake for the State Final at the 2026 Melbourne Royal Show.
- 7. An exhibitor having won at Show Level is not eligible to enter the VAS Jr Boiled Fruit Cake Competition at any other Show until after the Group Final judging.
- 8. An exhibitor is only eligible to represent one Group in the State Final.
- 9. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final level, then the second placegetter is eligible to compete.
- 10. If an exhibitor is found to have won more than one Group Final the exhibitor must forfeit/refund all prizes and will be disqualified from exhibiting for 12 months.

### Recipe Ingredients

Preferred 100% Australian Grown Produce 375g mixed fruit ¾ cup brown sugar ½ cup water ½ cup sherry 1 cup self-raising flour

### Method

125g butter 2 eggs, lightly beaten 1 cup plain flour 1 teaspoon mixed spice ½ teaspoon bicarbonate soda 2 tablespoons marmalade ¼ teaspoon salt Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to the boil. Simmer gently for 3 minutes, then remove from stove, add bicarbonate soda and allow to cool. Add the sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well. Fold in the sifted dry ingredients then place in a greased and lined 20cm round cake tin. Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1.5 hours or until cooked when tested.

### **Recipe Ingredients**

2 ½ cups self-raising flour ¼ tsp ground nutmeg 1/3 cup chopped in half Sultanas 1 tbsp orange marmalade 2 eggs, lightly beaten 1 cup reduced fat milk

### Method

1 tsp ground cinnamon 1 cup brown sugar (firmly packed) 1 cup coarsely grated carrot 1 cup canola oil ¾ cup orange juice 1. Pre-heat oven to 190C (moderately hot) 2. Line a 12 hole muffin pan with round paper muffin cases - Classic white muffin case size can vary between (30mm - 40mm Height x 70mm - 80mm Wide x 45mm - 55mm Base) 3. Sift dry ingredients into a large bowl, stir in sultanas and carrots. Then add the combined marmalade, oil, eggs, juice and milk. Mix until just combined. 4. Spoon mixture evenly into muffin paper cases in muffin pan. 5. Cook for 20 minutes. To test if muffins are cooked insert cake skewer, if it comes out clean the muffins are ready. 6. Stand muffins in pan for 5 minutes before removing to cool. 7. Show Entries: Four (4) muffins per plate

Ingredients - Preferred 100% Australian Grown Produce

250g sultanas 250g currants 90g chopped red glace cherries 1/3 cup sherry or brandy 60g self-raising flour 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger 250g butter 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence 250g chopped raisins 125g chopped mixed peel 90g chopped blanched almonds 250g plain flour 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves 250g soft brown sugar 1/2 teaspoon almond essence 4 large eggs

### Method

- Cut the fruit & almonds into 3-4 pieces and mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy.
- Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.
- Sift together the flours and spices.
- Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences.
- Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures.
- Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.
- Place the mixture into a prepared tin 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours.
- Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

### Recipe

Ingredients 375g plain flour 1 ½ tsp bicarb soda ½ tsp ground nutmeg Pinch of Salt 350 ml vegetable oil 3 medium carrots, grated (350 grams) 180g pecan nuts coarsely crushed 2tsp baking powder 2tsp ground cinnamon ½ tsp allspice 345g castor sugar 4 eggs 220g tin crushed pineapple, drained.

### Method

- Preheat the oven to 180C (160C fan), Grease a 23cm (9 inch) round cake tin and line with baking paper.
- Sift the dry ingredients together into a bowl. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs and oil, then add to the dry ingredients. Mix well then add the carrots, crushed pineapple and pecans. Mix to form a smooth batter and pour into the cake tin.
- Bake for approximately 90 100 minutes.
- Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes in the tin on a wire rack.
   Upend and allow to cool on the wire rack.

### **Decorated Cakes**

All decorations to be hand made from icing sugar ribbon and stamens allowed. Miniature cake must fit inside a 16cm cube. Cleats must be attached to cake boards.
